"The heart of the war is a war for the heart"

Mark 11:15-19 ESV

And they came to Jerusalem. And he entered the temple and began to drive out those who sold and those who bought in the temple, and he overturned the tables of the money-changers and the seats of those who sold pigeons. And he would not allow anyone to carry anything through the temple. And he was teaching them and saying to them, "Is it not written, 'My house shall be called a house of prayer for all the nations'? But you have made it a den of robbers." And the chief priests and the scribes heard it and were seeking a way to destroy him, for they feared him, because all the crowd was astonished at his teaching. And when evening came they went out of the city.

But shall we say, 'From man'?"—they were afraid of the people, for they all held that John really was a prophet.

-How does the fear of man affect someone who is considering repenting and following Christ?
What can cruel people do to that person? Is there anything worse than that?*
-During this Christmas season how can you participate in Jesus rescue mission?
-Who are some in your own life Jesus may be calling you to share the gospel with this season?
-How can your grow group help you in what the Lord is calling you to do?
