"For no matter how many promises God has made, they are 'yes' in Christ. And so through Him the 'amen' is spoken by us to the glory of God" (2 Cor 1:20).

D.A. Carson Quote "Jesus came not to abolish the Old Testament, but to fulfill it in the sense that He Himself was the object toward which it pointed... Jesus doesn't conceive of His life and ministry in terms of opposition to the Old Testament, but in terms of bringing to fruition that toward which it points. Thus, the law and the prophets, far from being abolished, find their valid continuity in terms of their outworking in Jesus."

John Stott Quote "The Old Testament contains, for example, doctrinal teaching, instruction about God and humanity and salvation. All the great biblical doctrines are there, but it was only a partial revelation. Jesus fulfilled it all in the sense of bringing it to completion by His person, His teaching, and His work... Jesus' purpose was not to change the law, but to reveal the full depth of meaning God intended the law to have."

John Stott Quote: "Once again the religious teachers of Jesus' day were attempting to limit the scope of God's commandment that said, "You shall not commit adultery." In their view they and their followers kept the seventh commandment if they avoided the act of adultery. But Jesus taught differently. He affirmed that the true meaning of God's command was much wider and deeper than a simple prohibition of acts of sexual sin. Just as the prohibition of murder included hateful thoughts and insulting words, the prohibition of adultery included lustful looks and a sex-driven imagination. We can commit murder with our words; we can commit adultery in our hearts."

Kent Hughes Quote: "Mental infidelity leaves one completely guilty. Few male and female believers have not crossed the line from attraction to lust at some time. We are all adulterers by this standard. The great eighteenth-century commentator Albert Bengel knew this well and wrote, "Thus God looks upon the heart, in which, alas! what is not committed?"4 The realization of this ought to deliver us from all judgmentalism and pious condescension toward those who have fallen to adultery. And it should instill within us a poverty of spirit and a humility that realizes we are spiritually bankrupt and makes us amazed that God loves us as he does."
