Matthew 7:21-23

21 "Not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of heaven, but the one who does the will of my Father who is in heaven. 22 On that day many will say to me, 'Lord, Lord, did we not prophesy in your name, and cast out demons in your name, and do many mighty works in your name?' 23 And then will I declare to them, 'I never knew you; depart from me, you workers of lawlessness.'

"One that day."

"Lord, Lord"

The danger of confessions that involve our lips and not our lives.

Mathew 7:22-23

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By and large, Jesus gives us the simple rather than the sensational and sporadic.

"We have become preoccupied today with the extraordinary, sporadic, non-universal ministries of the Spirit to the neglect of the ordinary, general gifts. We show a great deal of interest in healing and tongues - gifts of which Paul pointed out, not all Christians are meant to partake - than the Spirit's ordinary work of giving peace, joy, hope, and love." - J.I. Packer "Knowing God"

Great preaching and great effects are not infallible.

What is Jesus looking for from us?

Matthew 7:21

21 "Not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of heaven, but the one who does the will of my Father who is in heaven.

Jesus exposes a faith that denies the obligation to obedience, service, and sacrifice.

1 Thessalonians 1:3 (NIV)

We continually remember before our God and Father your work produced by faith, your labor prompted by love, and your endurance inspired by hope in our Lord Jesus Christ.

Life is indivisible.

"I never knew you."

Things get intimate when you are relying on the work on someone else.

Grow Group Discussion Questions

- What did God say to you during our Sunday gathering?
- Why do your think these verses provoke concern and fear in Christians?
- Jesus highlights sound doctrinal and spiritual expression. How are both of these great markers of a changed life but not always evidence of real faith?
- Discuss the idea that by and large, Jesus gives us simple expressions of faith rather than the sensational and sporadic.
- Which one, doctrine or spiritual experiences, do you tend to seek to validate and strengthen your faith? When can Bible study and spiritual experiences miss what is most important?
- Jesus doesn't leave us worried regarding Christianity but clarifies that the real Christian is "the one who does the will of the Father?" How does this clarify but also challenge? What does this mean to you?
